## Announcement for WHITRAP's Domestic Training Course on Historic Urban Landscapes (HUL), 4 – 8 November 2013

## <u>Introduction to the Training Course</u>

On 10 November 2011 UNESCO's General Conference adopted the UNESCO *Recommendation on the Historic Urban Landscape*, which was the culmination of a 6-year scientific and policy process to elaborate a new international instrument for the conservation of historic cities. This new instrument addresses the need to better frame heritage conservation strategies within the larger goals of urban sustainable development, in order to support public and private actions aimed at preserving and enhancing the quality of the built environment.

The Historic Urban Landscape (HUL) approach is a way of seeing and interpreting the city as a continuum in time and space (instead of cutting it up into separate conservation areas, which thereby become ghettos of historic preservation that are unsustainable), where many population groups have left their marks, and continue to do so today. This recognition and understanding needs to guide the city's management, including the conservation of its historic structures and spaces, which should be integrated into processes of urban and spatial planning and socio-economic development.

## The Structure of the Training Course

On 12 and 13 October 2012 an international Expert Meeting was organized by WHITRAP in Shanghai to discuss the implementation of the new UNESCO *Recommendation on the Historic Urban Landscape* (HUL) and subsequent application of the HUL approach in China. Key issues that guided the discussion included the proper interpretation of Historic Urban Landscape in Chinese; the main objectives of the HUL approach; and the required toolkit for application of the HUL approach at the local level.

All these aspects, embedded in a general history and overview of urban conservation in China and Europe, and related to the implementation of the 1972 UNESCO World Heritage Convention (where the origins of Historic Urban Landscapes come from), have been included in a new Training Course to be conducted by WHITRAP in Shanghai from Monday 4 to Friday 8 November 2013. The Domestic Training Course on Historic Urban Landscapes consists of 6 different modules, one Special Case presentation on Shanghai followed by an extensive study tour in or around Shanghai, and a closing public debate about the development of a 'Road Map' (specific guidelines) for the application of HUL in China.

The Training Course participants will be expected to attend all lectures and engage in the discussion sessions, as well as the closing public debate. It will be expected that participants come prepared by assembling a brief file on a World Heritage site or case study of their choice, preferably where they work or study. Further details will be provided. The Training modules will be taught by distinguished Professors of Tongji University's College of Architecture and Urban Planning and international Experts in urban conservation.
